Academic Regalia

The academic regalia worn today originated in the universities of the Middle Ages. When a vassal gave land and food to a lord, the lord gave the vassal protection and the right to use the lord's courts. The vassal gave the lord the right to use the lord's courts. The color of the regalia, whether it is black or colored, indicated the following:

In 1961, the State Legislature established the Vermont State College system, and Lyndon Teachers College became Lyndon State College. Degree programs in the liberal arts were added to complement the teacher training programs that had defined the college from day one. This was the beginning of a period of rapid growth and, in 1964, the campus began to expand one by one: a library, a dormitory, a dining hall, a science wing, a gymnasium, and a theater appeared.

The growing student population and changing demands ushered in rapid expansion of the Lyndon curriculum. In the 1970s, new programs were added in business administration, special education, recreation, meteorology, communications, human services, and physical education. During this decade the original Vail Manor was deemed unsafe and the Theodore N. Vail Center was built on the site of the old estate. It now houses the Vail Museum, preserving the name that has long been an integral part of the Lyndon tradition.

In the late 1970s, the college recognized the needs of area educators for continued professional development and began a master's program in education. Today Northern Vermont University-Lyndon has a growing graduate program offering teachers and administrators opportunities for advanced study, master's degrees in special education and curriculum and instruction.

Steady growth continued in the 1980s and 1990s with more new construction and the development of academic programs in response to the evolving needs of the community. A twenty-five meter, six-lane pool was added to the recreational facilities in the Sola Center, and the completion of the Library Academic Center expanded the space available for both library collections and classrooms.

A Brief History of Northern Vermont University - Lyndon



Founded as a one-year "normal" school for teacher training located at nearby Lyndon Institute, the institution now known as Northern Vermont University-Lyndon has evolved continuously since its establishment in 1911. Concurrent with educational practices of the times, the school, then known as Lyndon Training College, expanded its curriculum to include science and the first two-year class graduated in 1923. In 1927, Rita Sola became principal of the school and oversaw the graduation of the first three-year class of nine students in 1924. Ten years later, the state allowed Lyndon to grant four-year degrees and long as it remained a local learning institution, the first four-year degrees were granted to 18 students in 1946. By the time Vermont's Northeast Kingdom had come to depend on Lyndon to address the educational needs of its residents.

Miss Sola, who led the school until 1956, gave prominence in the campus history. She worked to encourage the Vermont State Legislature to establish Lyndon Teachers College, saw the admission of the first male and first non-local students during the 1940s, and oversaw the college's move to its current location, the former estate of Theodore N. Vail, Vail, first president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, had been instrumental in the establishment of Lyndon Institute, and Miss Sola recognized the vacant estate as the perfect place to house the growing college. The move to Vail Manor was completed on June 30, 1951, the day the school's name at Lyndon Institute was set to expire.

At the start of the 21st century, shifting demographics indicated a need for innovative and alternative methods of instruction, including evening and weekend, and in alternative formats, including online courses. Degree programs are designed to prepare students for a wide variety of professions, enhanced by an emphasis on experiential learning in real-world situations, career counseling, and the acquisition of skills critical for success in the workplace. Unchanged is NVU's commitment to providing students with a strong foundation in the liberal arts as a key component of readying them for successful and satisfying careers in a rapidly changing world.

In 2005, a new residence hall and community building was constructed. The building was named the Rita L. Sola Complex, a continuing tribute to Miss Sola's legacy. In 2009 increasing enrollment led to the construction of The Academic and Student Activity Center, housing three academic departments, an event center, and additional computer labs. In 2014, the event center in this new building was dedicated to former President Clifford A. Moore and his late husband, Thomas Moore.

On July 1, 2016, in the bold move of reimagining higher education in our small state, Lyndon State College and Johnson State College unified to become Northern Vermont University, a two-campus institution of higher learning. Each campus retains its rich history and identity, as well as its athletic teams - the Lyndon Hornets and Johnson Badgers - but the collaboration and student opportunities now expand across two vibrant campuses located in Vermont's northern tier.



Guest Speaker
Henry S. Parker

Author, Professor, Marine Scientist, Expeditioner
Henry S. (" Hank") Parker is a writer of both fiction and non-fiction, and an adjunct associate professor at Georgetown University's School of Medicine. He lectures and publishes on threats to U.S. food and agriculture and on scientific and natural history topics with a goal of communicating science to non-scientists. His debut novel, *Contaminant*, a bioterrorism thriller, was published by Simon & Schuster (Touchstone imprint) in January 2017.

Hank holds a Ph.D. in biological oceanography and was formerly a research manager and Acting Director of Homeland Security for the Agricultural Research Service of USDA. He has also been a university professor of marine sciences, a U.S. Naval officer and deep-sea salvage diver, a seasoned learner in the southern Philippines, and was co-leader of an expedition that discovered and recovered remains of a seventeenth-century Spanish Manila galleon.

He and his wife, Sue, live in Sutton. He is Vice Chair of Sutton's Planning Commission and Development Review Board, a Board member for the League of Vermont Writers, and a Corporator for Northern Vermont Regional Hospital. He has enjoyed working with Northern Vermont University faculty and staff members to encourage and support young writers.
